



'Tees' the season: Local youth golf nonprofit surprised by THE PLAYERS' Red Coats with a \$10,000 donation

On Saturday, Dec. 12, golf practice for the dozens of Moore-Myers Children's Fund youth who show up each week at Brentwood Golf Course to hone their skills was unlike any other. Members of THE PLAYERS' volunteer leadership team, the Red Coats, made a surprise visit, presenting the Moore-Myers Children's Fund with a check for \$10,000.

These funds will be utilized to purchase equipment the nonprofit organization advised was needed to support their program, as well as the golf programs they adopted at William M. Raines High School.

Moore-Myers Children's Fund was founded in 2014 to support Jacksonville youth in underserved communities through golf instruction and mentorship. Under the leadership of founders Dr. Justine Redding and Richard Blackston, a husband and wife duo, Moore-Myers provides services that help undergird participants' skills, exceptional character and total wellness, ultimately helping children develop a road map to success, stay physically and mentally active and obtain college scholarship opportunities

The Moore-Myers Children's Fund currently serves over 100 Jackson-ville youth and is based out of Brent-wood Golf Course, just outside of downtown Jacksonville. They receive weekly golf instruction, mentorship and financial support covering equipment fees and membership dues to First Tee-North Florida.

Local Rotary uses video technology to connect with 1st female Rotary club president, other distinguished speakers

There is no questioning the adverse impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, but for the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach, there is a silver lining. The increased use of video conferencing technology is enabling the club to hear from distinguished speakers beyond Northeast Florida, such as Dr. Sylvia Whitlock

Based in California, Whitlock recently spoke to the Ponte Vedra Beach Rotary via Zoom and discussed her trailblazing path to become the first female president of a Rotary club in 1987.

"Dr. Whitlock is revered in the Rotary world and in American history, and we were honored to have her join us," said Sam Hall, president of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach. "Her story of courage and perseverance inspired our club, as it has inspired so many for decades."

Whitlock started her Rotary journey in the early 1980s when she was invited to join the Rotary Club of Duarte in Los Angeles County, California. She was an elementary school principal in Duarte and one of a few women in the community invited to the club at the time. Rotary International did not then admit women as members, however, so the club ultimately lost its charter as a result of its inclusionary actions.

After losing its charter, the club renamed itself the Ex-Rotary Club of Duarte and continued to meet and serve its community independent of Rotary for several years. In what became a long, tumultuous fight, the club took its case to court and became known as the "mouse that roared." After back-and-forth legal challenges at the state and federal levels, the U.S. Supreme Court

ruled in the Duarte club's favor in 1987. Women could officially become Rotarians, which allowed Whitlock to become the first female president of a Rotary club.

"It was fascinating to hear Dr. Whitlock tell this story," said Bruce Barber, a long-time Rotarian and past president of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach. "I met her at a Rotary International convention in Atlanta a few years back, and I was humbled then that she asked me to dance after winning an award. A few years later, our entire club was humbled to host her and hear about this important piece of Rotary and American history."

In addition to Whitlock, the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach has utilized Zoom in 2020 to host Rotary International's Immediate Past President Mark Maloney, Florida Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis, and a number of international partners supporting the club's service project in Guatemala, among others.

The Lightner Museum was alive with the sounds of the season Friday and Saturday, Dec. 11-12, when the St. Augustine Orchestra performed holiday favorites for visitors during "Music in the Museum: Holiday Nights at the Lightner."

Visitors had an opportunity to enjoy the music while touring the iconic St. Augustine institution, shopping for unique holiday gifts and sampling wine out on the terrace.

"We've never done something like this before," said Angela de Gregory, the museum's volunteer coordinator and events manager. "Typically, the orchestra plays in a very traditional setting where you have chairs lined-up theater-style."

But concerns about COVID-19 have made that impossible.

"They still wanted to play, and we still wanted them here," de Gregory continued. "But we had to come up with a solution where they could do it safely."

By having the orchestra perform in different ensembles at different places throughout the Lightner, social distancing could be maintained. In addition, having the entire museum open for guests gave them space to spread out. Masks were required.

The idea proved a success. The ticketed event was sold out both evenings, with 175 guests each night.

The orchestra's brass ensemble performed in the grand lobby, the string ensemble performed in the former pool area and the woodwind ensemble performed in one of the gallery spaces. Performance times were staggered so that visitors could attend each.

For some, the event represented the first time since the museum reopened in May that they could see the changes made last spring. During a two-month closure necessitated by COVID-19, the entire first floor was repainted and refloored, new restrooms were constructed and a lot of plumbing and electrical work was done.

Rota, the taxidermied lion once owned by Winston Churchill was spruced up. A new, 188-square-foot mural by Jacksonville artist Joshua Cooper decorated a wall in one of the display areas. And the new gift shop was decked out in holiday style.

Guests had an opportunity to see the museum's newest exhibit, "Illuminate: Lightner Museum's Stained Glass Rediscovered," which features 12 newly restored stained-glass windows and a





The ongoing distribution has earned volunteers and staff praise for their resiliency as they serve the influx of families who have been hit hard by the economic impact of COVID-19.





Baptist HealthPlace at Nocatee brings together health, fitness services

Area residents who want to stay healthy and fit have a new, convenient resource: Baptist HealthPlace at Nocatee.

The health hub, which opened in November, is designed around the fitness, wellness, medical and therapeutic needs of those living and working in the growing community and surrounding areas.

The two-story, 87,000-square-foot center sits on a 12-acre site west of Nocatee Town Center and the Lakeside neighborhood and faces Nocatee Parkway.

It features a YMCA, Baptist Center for Healthy Living, Baptist Primary Care, Brooks Rehabilitation, Seasons Café and Wolfson Children's Rehabilitation.

In addition, a range of medical specialties for adults and children, as well as on-site imaging and lab services, are expected to open in the spring.

"Baptist HealthPlace at Nocatee was created with the input of people living in this community, and what services they told us would be of value," said Baptist Health President and CEO Brett McClung. BROOKS REHABILITATION CENTER

Physical therapy for orthopedic condi-

tions is offered to adolescents and adults. The center has three physical therapists and may soon add a fourth.

"I love the whole HealthPlace," said center manager Karen MacPherson, who likened it to a "one-stop shop" for health services. "Nocatee needed this building."

SEASONS CAFÉ

Visitors will find fresh, convenient food and drink options here for the whole family.

WOLFSON CHILDREN'S REHABILITATION

Therapies and treatments are offered for children age 2½ to 12 experiencing developmental delays, neurological disorders and more.

This clinic specializes in intensive occupational therapy and physical therapy and rehabilitation services. Sessions are two-to-three hours per day, five days a week for three weeks. Traditional services — including speech therapy — are also being offered.

One benefit of having a facility like this is that it gives area families an alternative to long waiting lists at clinics hundreds of miles away.

"There is not another program like this

in the area at all," said Suzanne Barje, system manager for Wolfson Children's Rehabilitation Services. "Our families who seek this out have to travel to go to intensive therapy. So, I think that we're one of a kind, which is super cool."

YMCA AT NOCATEE

Among the highlights here are innovative, app-connected strength and cardio equipment; group exercise, including yoga and indoor cycling; KidZone with enrichment activities; Teen Center; an "airnasium" open air gym; and activities for all ages.

The E Gym is of special interest. Members wear a wristband that signals exercise equipment to adapt specifically to each person's body.

"It remembers all your information," said operations director Becky Richmond. "It knows if you have any muscle imbalances. If you're quad dominant versus hamstring."

Beginning in January, the Y will promote use of the Myzone app, which monitors heart rate, calories and time exercising and converts the information into Myzone Effort Points.

"You use it as a tool to help reach your goals," Richmond said.

Other equipment uses the Advagym app, which keeps track of the user's data, such as sets and reps. For free weights, Advagym provides a library of exercises possible with the equipment.

In the spring, Baptist HealthPlace will expand to offer several additional services. Slated to open are: Baptist Pediatrics, Baptist Behavioral Health (for adults and children), Baptist Heart Health Specialists, Borland Groover (gastrointestinal and liver care), imaging and lab services (screening mammography, X-rays, ultrasounds, bone density scans, bloodwork and more), and OB-GYN services from North Florida OB-GYN, Trogolo Obstetrics and Gynecology and Women's Physicians of Jacksonville.


They partnered with the St. Augustine Amphitheater to create a Performance Pavilion, where they have plans to bring live concerts/events throughout the new year.

The Cultural Council of Greater Jacksonville is responsible for many of the public art displays around Jacksonville and The Beaches, including the new light display on the Water Street parking garage in downtown Jacksonville, but it also assists the North Florida arts and culture scene in many other ways.

Following the belief that everyone benefits from access to arts and culture, the Cultural Council has recently launched its second annual ARTSee & Shop at a gallery located in the St. John's Town

The gallery, which opened to the public on Nov. 7, is home to artwork and installations from over 60 local artists. All artwork inside the gallery is for sale, and 65% of the proceeds go directly back to the artists themselves.

On the walls of the gallery guests will see hundreds of paintings and photography pieces. The gallery showcases dozens of unique installations, such as a collaboration with the University of North Florida's LGBTQ Resource Center. In this particular installation guests have the opportunity to walk into "closets," wherein they will find a mirror and informational brochures plastered to the walls detailing what it means to be a member of the LGBTQ community, and allowing a

moment of self-reflection.

Diana Donovan, Executive Director of the office of the president, was passionate about making art readily available for the

"Art needs to be accessible," Donovan said, explaining that the ARTSee & Shop gallery is an entirely unique experience, different from touring a museum or a regular art gallery. Here, the gallery is immersive and the pieces are still available for purchase.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, over 22,644 people in the arts have been displaced, losing roughly \$235 million.

"People do not realize that for artists, this is their livelihood," said Donovan. "It puts food on their tables."

The Council's website dedicates an entire page to resources for displaced artists, helping them find ways to make ends meet in these difficult times. Another way the Council set out to help was by opening the ARTSee & Shop gallery, employing artists to both contribute art pieces and work the store.

At the gallery, masks and social distancing are required while inside, but the Cultural Council of Greater Jacksonville invites guests to visit and explore the multitude of beautiful artworks on display, or participate in one of their many programs/workshops offered at the gallery throughout the month of December.


For Lewis, who remains on the road year-round, new songs are the most excit-

Ponte Vedra kept its early season winning streak alive following a 48-41 victory over arch-rival Nease on Friday, Dec. 11. After defeating Fleming Island (59-46) and St. Augustine St. Joseph (29-21) earlier in the week, the win over Nease marked the second week in a row in which the Sharks won all three of their scheduled games.

With a suffocating defense, and a team loaded with depth, the Sharks head to Creekside High on Thursday, Dec. 17, in an attempt to keep their streak intact. Although Junior Luke Pirris is the only Shark to average in double figures (15.4 ppg.), second-year head coach Kevin Whirity has seen seven of his players score in double figures at one time or another during the early part of the season.

While Pirris once again led Shark scorers with 16 points against Nease, the Sharks got a real spark from a pair of seniors who stepped up to rescue their mates. Jack Polian netted a career-high 14 points, while Rory Mayer added a season-high 10 tallies.

When asked if he was surprised at the play he got from Polian and Mayer, Whirity replied, "surprised, no ... Impressed, Yes.

Mayer is simply a 'gamer' who scored from all depths on the court, distributed, rebounded (nine total), and locked down some great offensive weapons. Polian was our "in the Arena" award recipient for his play and he now has a timeless memory by hitting four three pointers against his archrival."

Although many of the Shark shooters had an off night, certainly their defense

didn't take the day off. Trailing 30-27 heading into the final quarter, the Sharks held the Panthers to two field goals over the final eight minutes, while piling up 21 points to pull away from their rival.

"Defense is the backbone of our program and our guvs take tremendous pride in working to perfect their craft," Whirity said following the contest.

Earlier last week, Nease defeated Oakleaf 50-47 with junior Matt Guzie leading a balanced offensive attack with 10 points. After a road game this past Tuesday at Palm Coast, coach Josh Bailen's team will travel to St. Augustine Friday, Dec. 18, to play the Yellowjackets.

Titans, Henry prevail 31-10 as Minshew comes off bench for Jaguars

Tennessee running back and former Yulee standout Derrick Henry ran for 215 yards and two touchdowns on 26 carries to help lead the Titans to a 31-10 victory over the Jaguars last Sunday at TIAA Bank Field.

It was Henry's ninth consecutive 100-yard contest on the road, and the fourth 200-yard game of his career. Two of Henry's 200-yard performances have come against the

Gardner Minshew, the Jacksonville starting quarterback through the first seven games of 2020, will start against the Baltimore Ravens on Sunday.

Coach Doug Marrone announced the decision on a Monday media conference call.

We're going to keep trying to do things and keep working to see ... whatever the combination is and whatever we have to do coaching-wise," Marrone said. "We're not going to just stalemate ourselves. We're constantly trying to figure out how we can get ourselves in position to make plays – both players and coaches. We just haven't been able to be consistent and do a good enough job with it."

Trailing 3-0, Minshew replaced Mike Glennon on Sunday. Jacksonville (1-12) drove the field and cut the lead to 31-10 on a five-yard touchdown pass from Minshew to

Cole caught his fifth TD of the season in the third quar-

ter. Cole has caught 47 passes for 571 yards and five TDs this season and joins wide receiver Allen Hurns as the only undrafted player in franchise history with five-plus receiving TDs in a single season.

That was as close as the Jaguars came to winning their second game of the season.

Running back James Robinson gained 67 yards on the ground and caught four passes for 16 yards in the game. He became the fourth undrafted rookie in NFL history to total at least 1,000 rushing yards, and the fastest to do so, on his longest rush of the season, a 47-yard gain in the fourth quarter.

Robinson is the third rookie running back in Jaguars history to total 1,000 yards in a season and the fourth running back overall in franchise annals to rush for 1,000-plus yards.

Titans QB Ryan Tannehill completed 19-of-24 passes for 212 yards and two touchdowns and a 131.2 passer rating. Titans receiver A.J. Brown had seven catches for 112 yards and a touchdown in the game.

Jacksonville defensive end Dawuane Smoot made two tackles and recorded the first forced fumble of his career, recovered by which rookie defensive tackle Doug Costin. After the turnover Aldrick Rosas kicked a 53-yard field goal to make it 7-3. Earlier Titans defensive lineman DaQuan Jones blocked a 53-yard field goal try by Rosas.

Jaguars linebacker Joe Schobert eclipsed 500 career tackles when he notched his first tackle of the game in the first quarter. He finished with eight tackles, marking his fourth-consecutive game with at least eight tackles. Through 13 games this season, he has a team-leading 113 tackles and two pass interceptions. Schobert is the only player in the NFL since 2016 with 500-plus tackles and eight-plus interceptions.

Center Brandon Linder is expected to miss Sunday's game with an ankle injury that kept him out against the

The Jaguars play at 1 p.m. Sunday at Baltimore.



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
