



Winter Wonderland: Protecting your North Florida landscape

North Florida is not known for ever resembling a winter wonderland ... but this weekend could bring us closer to a white Christmas than we are dreaming of! It's time to protect your

landscape, especially tropical plants!
In preparation for this weekend's

- Bring potted plants inside if possible.
- When temperatures drop below 40 degrees (but not sooner!), cover tropicals, sensitive plants, and citrus trees with frost cloth (available online or at a local hardware store). Without frost cloth, linens and blankets may work, but they can weigh down plants and block sunlight if left on for multiple days. Do

NOT use plastic to cover plants as it can worsen a frost burn. Use clothes pins, stakes, rocks, etc to hold cloth down to the ground... form a tent by securing the edges of the cloth to the ground to hold warm air around the plants.

- Mulch. If you haven't mulched lately, a new layer of mulch can help protect plants from the freezing temperatures.
- After the freeze, remove cover as soon as temperatures will be over 40 degrees. You may need to recover plants if evening temperatures drop below 40

degrees again.

Tropical plants are the most sensitive to freezes; they do not like temperatures below 40 degrees. Be sure to protect crotons, Hawaiian ti, arbicola, ginger,

bird of paradise, hibiscus, Roebellini palms, Adonidia palms, lady palms, bougainvillea, mandevilla, gold mound, sea grapes, stromatha, tibouchina, philodendron, xanadoo, crown of thorns, kalanchoe, sunpatiens, etc.

Below 32 degrees, be sure to protect sensitive plants such as blue daze, pentas, geraniums, bush daisies, gold dust, sedum and salvia.

All citrus trees should be protected/covered below 30 degrees!

Winter annuals such as snapdragons, pansies, petunias and supertunias should manage the freezing temperatures even if they get a bit frost burned. Covering them can help but is not necessary.



As told to Anthony Richards

Tell us a little about yourself and your background.

I was born in Northern Ireland and have been in the U.S. for 18 years, becoming a U.S. citizen last year.

I worked in the fashion industry and for some prestigious names throughout Europe for years. I worked with runway shows and even pressed the outfits worn by Bono.

However, I decided in 2006 to go back to my fine arts roots, which I first discovered as a child, and that's where I find myself today.

What was the transition to the fine arts world like?

It was a massive pivot for me in my life, and it was a risky decision, but I had my husband's full support and we decided to give it a go.

I segwayed into the fine arts field seemingly overnight, and I got my first opportunity to show my work thanks to Worley Favor, who is a local potter, and his wife Dena, who allowed me to place my artwork in their gallery.

They were just great patrons of art, having been a part of that world themselves. I walked in off the street as a rookie, and they took a chance on me.

Worley appreciated that I had decided to shift careers and go into the fine arts, because he had done so as

I started with having three or four paintings on display, but soon I had a full wall in their gallery.

Not long after that, I met Anne Packard and really admired her work. She said one day that she would give me 15 minutes to critique my work, and we just hit it off.

Since then, she has always been there to be a mentor for me, and I credit all of them for helping create a massive shift that took place in my work.

I used to work on these big creative teams in the fashion industry, but I've found that even as an independent artist, you have to find that same type of structure but for yourself.

The galleries are so helpful in spreading the word, and I could not do it without them.

Is there a certain style of artwork you specialize in?

I work in a form called plein air painting, which is French for "outdoor

I've got a sketch book in the car at all times, because you never know when you'll cross something that makes for a

great subject to capture.

I'm known for doing large scale seascapes, landscapes and some botanicals and florals.

What do you enjoy most about being an artist?

You're always developing your voice through your work and define who you are with your paintings.

Since then, I've gotten galleries that show my work all around, including ones in Naples, Fernandina Beach and Cape Cod in Massachusetts. Plus, I have my little studio in St. Augustine that sits one block from the bay.

It is so rewarding to just stand there off to the side and watch people and their expressions when they first see my work. The work has to speak for itself and to the person looking at.

I've even spent time imagining the type of homes it would go in once sold, and how amazing it would look hanging in a room and adding to a person's home.

Art is one of those things that can add such personality to a room.

Where do you get your ideas for your artwork from?

We are blessed to live in this idyllic

part of the world and it's all about capturing what's around me.

I can get so many ideas just driving to my studio from Vilano Beach, where we have the marshes and then into St. Augustine where you've got the amazing seascape. It's just so beautiful and there's so much to capture.

I always take the coastal drive anytime I go up to my Fernandina Beach gallery, because the landscape is incorporated into my work like nothing else.

A1A, Mickler Road intersection improvements in works

St. Johns County has a plan on how to improve the traffic and extended backups taking place at the intersection of State Road A1A, Mickler Road and Ponte Vedra Boulevard.

That plan was presented to the community for feedback during an open house at the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall Dec. 13, where members of the county's

public works department were on hand to answer questions and explain the project to residents.

The goal of the project is to improve traffic flow by adding two additional turn lanes on Mickler Road to turn onto A1A heading north; one additional left-turn lane from Ponte Vedra Boulevard for those heading south on A1A; and one additional lane northbound on A1A.

The estimated project budget is \$4.3 million and will be funded through impact fees and a grant awarded from the Florida Department of Transportation.

"About five or six years ago, the North Florida TPO (Transportation Planning Organization) did a study along A1A and identified some intersections that needed improvements, and this is one of those intersections," St. Johns County Engi-

neer Duane Kent said. "In the mornings and in the evenings, you wait for several cycles of the light to get through."

According to Kent, if nothing is done, the length of time with which people are having to wait will only continue to grow.

"Right now, it's kind of bad for an



Holiday heart syndrome — what you need to know

It's the "most wonderful" time of the year, but maybe not when it comes to our hearts. Unfortunately, more heartrelated ER visits and deaths occur during

the Christmas and New Year's holiday season, according to the American Heart Association. A study in the British Medical Journal shows the risk of heart attack actually peaks at 10 p.m. on Christmas Eve, especially for older and sicker people.

Another concern is "holiday heart syndrome," which typically presents with an abrupt onset of atrial fibrillation (AFib) after drinking more alcohol than usual. This can be frightening, including symptoms of rapid heart rate, shortness of breath, fainting, fatigue and heart

palpitations. For many, temporary AFib linked to holiday heart syndrome will resolve itself. But you can reduce your risk by being aware of the triggers and taking emergency steps when needed.

Don't Binge Drink

One of the top culprits of holiday heart is binge drinking. This typically occurs when men have more than five servings of alcohol in a two-hour span or women have more than four drinks in the same time period. Alcohol causes blood pressure to rise, but also exerts direct effects on the heart rhythm that promote arrhythmias. This puts us at risk for AFib symptoms and can even trigger a heart attack for those with underlying or undiagnosed heart issues.

It's important to note that the effects can last beyond the time you're binge drinking. In fact, a Harvard research review found that binge drinking six or more drinks in one night may raise a person's risk of heart-related events for an entire week after consumption. If you're going to drink alcohol, moderation is key. For best heart health, I recommend



zero to one drinks per day and never exceeding two drinks in a day.

Battling Heart Risk Factors Around the Holidays

The holidays usually bring heightened stress levels amidst all of the shopping, cooking and entertaining guests. These activities can raise blood pressure and set off a "fight or flight" response in the body that's hard on the heart. That's why taking time to relax, exercise and

It may be tempting to indulge, but eating large amounts of food high in saturated and trans-fat, cholesterol, salt and added sugars can put your heart at risk. I always recommend looking at all of your food options first. Then choose which food you'll eat or

hour, well if we let it go, then it will be an hour and a half to two hours and just keep growing," Kent said. "A lot of accidents are caused by people being impatient and pulling out when they shouldn't because they've been waiting so long. By reducing the time it takes to get through the intersection, it will improve the quality of life."

There will be two lanes to receive traf-

fic turning onto A1A going north from Mickler road, but one of those lanes will eventually merge into the other as it gets farther away from the intersection.

"A lot of people in the Ponte Vedra area are worried about the four-laning of Mickler and the four laning or six-laning of all of A1A," Kent said. "St. Johns County is growing, but we're not at the point where we need to do that right now."

However, he did not rule out the fact of that being a viable solution down the road, but at this point he sees the intersection improvements as the best fix for the current situation.

"There's always a few people who are vocal, but there just being passionate about where they live and what's going on in their neighborhood, and that's a great thing," Kent said. "If there is something that needs to be changed or can be changed, we will remain active during the construction."

Danielle Faldetta was one of the residents who attended the event and left with concerns about the project.

"I feel that they dropped the ball

year's ago, even though there was a massive plan for Nocatee," Faldetta said. "They really didn't do a great or thorough traffic plan of what this would do to what I would call the 'locals.' At this point, the traffic is so bad, that most people can't even make a righthand turn (onto A1A), forget about making a lefthand turn and going across traffic. Now we'll increase it to two turning lanes and have even more traffic flow, so it's only going to exasperate the issue."

Faldetta was also concerned about the safety of pedestrians walking and biking along the route with the proposed intersection improvements, because she












More than just a story

TPC Storytellers give record \$36K to four charities

The TPC Sawgrass Storytellers are known for two things, their amazing story-telling ability and raising money for charity, which they are getting just as good at, after raising \$36,000 for charities during 2022.

According to Storytellers captain Jim Kleck, the money raised this year set a record for the most money the group has brought in.

"Since 2007, we've given away more than \$263,000 to charities," Kleck said. "It's a big deal, and they are really happy to have that support."

What makes it even more special is that the \$36K raised by the group all came from tips that they had received throughout the year from guests who they toured around TPC Sawgrass, since they do not charge for the tours they offer

"The Storytellers program started up at TPC in 2007, and this past year we gave tours to 7,200 people from 45 different states and 35 foreign countries," Kleck said. "These tours are free to the public, but some are so gracious about the tour that they want to give us a gratuity, and when they do, we save it and at the end of the year we count up to see how much we have."

According to Kleck, meeting people from all over the world and sharing the TPC Sawgrass story is one of the most

interesting parts of the position.

Tours not only involve seeing around the TPC Sawgrass clubhouse, but also going out to see the final three holes on the stadium course, which is called "the gauntlet."

"And of course, part of that is No. 17 with it's 'island green,' and everyone wants a picture with that," Kleck said.

There are currently 45 "storytellers" in the group, but there are more in the wings that are in the process of joining.

"Most of these folks are retired like myself, who are looking for a volunteer job, and this is a really neat volunteer job, because you get to end up giving money to charity," Kleck said. "It's a highly-sought after volunteer job that people want to be a part of."

Once the money is counted the next step is giving it away to local charities, which is always done at the group's yearend meeting.

"We like to find small charities, where \$5K to \$10K really means a lot, and they can really use the help," Kleck said

This year's charities included a wide range of initiatives, including helping people fighting cancer, young adults with autism and veterans.

The four charities receiving donations were Chemo Noir, Peace of Heart Community, First Coast Honor Flights and Hugs Across the County, which were chosen by STAC, which is a committee comprised to sort through the applications sent in by charities in the area.

"This year they started out with 15 charitable organizations for review and worked their way all the way down to four," Kleck said.



There are currently 45 storytellers as part of the group, and the money they donated was raised from the tips they make by giving tours of TPC Sawgrass throughout the year.

The Ponte Vedra Sharks boys basketball team summed up their early season success with another marquee win, this time over the rival Nease Panthers, 48-44 on the road following a late comeback.

The Panthers led 22-13 at halftime and were looking in control, having grown their lead to double digits in the second half.

Cardiac Cats strike again, as Panthers draw with Knights in Holiday Cup

The Nease Panthers remained undefeated thanks to a 2-2 tie against Creekside in comeback fashion during the Second Annual Holiday Cup Dec. 20.

"I believe this team's got a lot of heart, and we don't like to quit easily," Nease senior Brogan Donnelly said. "I really wish we could have gotten the win, but we'll take the tie."

It was the third tie of the season for the Panthers (5-0-3) and not the first time they've used a second half comeback to tie or win a game.

After Creekside (9-3) scored two first half goals, the Panthers found themselves trailing and looking for answers during the half.

They wound up finding them in the form on both sides of the ball, as the offense spent a lot of time in possession during the second half and the result was crisp passing and plenty of scoring opportunities.

Donnelly scored both of the Panthers' goals, the first coming after he had a penalty kick blocked but was in perfect position to knock in the rebound to cut the deficit to one goal with seven minutes into the second half.

"My one and only mentality at the half was that I knew I had to score," Donnelly said.

The penalty kick was setup after Aiden Kennedy was pushed in the back by the Creekside goaltender in the penalty box.

The game-tying goal was of Donnelly being on the receiving end of a beautiful pass and then slicing through a pair of Knights' defenders before burying a shot with a powerful swing of his right foot.

"We've been close so many times to finishing on our chances, and he (Donnelly works really hard at finding those spaces," Nease head coach Fred Hallett said. "We switched him up to forward there for a little bit (in the second half) just to give us a little extra punch, and he definitely took advantage of it."

Evan Miriello and the Panthers' defense also adjusted in the second half and did not allow a goal after surrendering two in the first.

Miriello made key stops, including a double save early in the second half and one as the Knights made a push in the final minute to preserve the tie.

The game was part of a doubleheader of contest that made up the Second Annual Holiday Cup, where fans could donate money or items that will go toward local nonprofits Soaring High and the Betty Griffin Center. Bartram Trail and Mandarin played each other in the first game of the night.

Hallett has seen the event take steps forward in its first two years, after having Nease and Creekside as the only two teams involved last year. He is excited to see the path it takes in the years to come.

"I think it was really cool, because all of us coaches are friends and we joke with each other all the time and our players know each other really well, so it was fun to get the chance to play them," Hallett said. "It's so great when everyone gets invested to make something like this happen."






