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

# ONE OF US Garrett Gooch

### Tell us a little about yourself and your background.

First and foremost, I'm "one of us," as a Florida native. My earliest and fondest memories are of cooking and barbecuing with my dad in Sarasota and being outside exploring or fishing.

Learning to fish or gather the freshest, best Florida ingredients, different flavors and influences were not hard to find. You could go to almost any fish shack and experience a great meal without a lot of pretenses.

Sharing that joy of discovery and sharing something delicious really inspired me on my journey, beginning with culinary school at Johnson and Wales in Miami.

After graduation, I went to California to The Ritz-Carlton, Half Moon Bay. I was lured back to Florida with a job as executive sous chef at The Ritz-Carlton, West Palm Beach and then at The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island.

Garrett Gooch is the executive chef at The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island. I went west again, serving as executive chef of The Ritz-Carlton, Denver, and then I came home again to Florida, to The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island in 2015 as executive chef.

I also staged at Aioli, a beloved French-Mediterranean restaurant in Vienna, Austria. That experience, learning the European approach to life and seafood was very important to my work. They favor wild fish and focus on sustainability that adheres to the "less is more" approach to ingredients.

They use everything, tip to tail, nothing is wasted, even if it's to make a simple stock, bringing dimension to tomorrow's chowder.

It's a mindful approach to cooking that really brings me back home. There's a lot that's special about our state, and I try to communicate that with some of our activities at Amelia Island, like my *Hook, Line* & *Supper*, where I take guests out to some of my favorite fishing spots and the catch is included in special dinner at Salt.

How long have you been in the executive chef role at The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island? Just over five years.

> What are your goals and objectives you strive for in this role? First and foremost, it's to surprise and delight our guests and neighbors with our

distinctive Southern cuisine, leaving them satisfied with amazing food from all of our many restaurants.

We have a team of chefs that each have a distinctive style. Every month we feature one in our chefs in a cooking demonstration we call "Chefs Theater." I want them all to know they are stars.

We also have Chef Okan of Salt who already holds the AAA Five Diamond designation but who has also worked in several Michelin-starred restaurants. He's a star, but we'd like to help him achieve more recognition.

We just completed our wildly successful Amelia Island Cookout, a showcase of the northern Florida culinary scene which also brought to the island some of the world's top culinary talent.

It also featured vintners, producers, growers, mixologists, distillers, local chefs and up-and-coming culinary talent.

It's really created a buzz within the professional culinary scene and is bringing these gastro-pilgrims to Amelia Island as a destination. It's really inspiring and for 250 lucky guests, it was the experience of a lifetime.

Creating culinary events such as the Amelia Island Cookout that bring people in from all different areas to our beautiful island, that makes me very happy.

What are the most rewarding parts about your job? The most rewarding part for me is to create a unique experience through our food. People dine in restaurants for nourishment but mark special occasions and special life experiences with special dinners, and special wines are shared with loved ones.

But just being in Florida, that's a special occasion for a lot of people who've traveled from great distances to be here. I want to share my passion for this locale and its flavors, putting creativity into each and every dish. Sharing it with our guests and inspiring new culinary talent in our kitchens, that's success to me.

I also love working on festive season menus for the resort. From Thanksgiving to Christmas, to the New Year's Black & White Gala, our holiday meal celebrations are something that generations enjoy, and it makes me pleased that they think enough of us to share in their milestones.

My love for festive menus actually resulted in an appearance on The Today Show where I demonstrated our Butternut Squash Soup.

### What are some of the aspects of the industry that are more challenging that you have to account for?

Our industry encountered a major shift during COVID. Restaurants face the confluence of two difficulties, labor shortages and inflation, from the price of equipment and ingredients to labor. As an institution, The Ritz-

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

# NEWLY RENOVATED HISTORIC FLORIDA THEATRE REOPENS

The wait is over. The paint and plaster are dry. And the newly renovated historic Florida Theatre in downtown Jacksonville has reopened.

Mayor Donna Deegan and other dignitaries participated in a ribbon cutting on Oct. 27 inside the lobby/ auditorium for the big reveal. The first production, "The Rocky Horror Picture Show," opened the next evening.

The Florida Theatre had been closed since mid-July to renovate the 96-yearold facility. All the flaking and peeling decorative plaster in the auditorium was repaired; the lobbies and the auditorium were painted with fidelity to the 1927 color palette; the entire heating, ventilation and air conditioning system was replaced; and the building's electrical vault was moved from the first to the third floor.

But probably the thing people will notice the most is that all the public restrooms have been updated.

Ironically, the Florida Theatre reopened around the 40th anniversary of the last major renovation that took place in 1983.

These projects build upon projects that have already been accomplished at the Florida Theatre, which include replacing the Theatre's 1,865 seats; doubling the wheelchair-seating capacity; installing a new assistive listening system for people who are hearing-impaired; improving the aisle lighting and handrails, especially in the balcony; installing a new concert sound system and lighting system; and repurposing the second floor of the office building into the new Remedy Lounge, which was the first expansion of the venue's public space in 95 years.

The City of Jacksonville matched private donations to help fund the work. Contributions came also from the Centennial Campaign donors, Florida Theatre members and everyone in Northeast Florida who has ever bought a ticket to a show at the Florida Theatre and paid the \$4.50 restoration fee. The principal artisans worked feverishly to restore the building to its original grandeur.

"The Florida Theatre is one of downtown Jacksonville's gems," said Deegan. "With its 100th birthday approaching, this is an exciting time to restore the theater to its full splendor."

Auld and White Constructors was the general contractor for this project. Sauer Mechanical did the HVAC work. EverGreene Architectural Arts did all the plaster/paint work and restored the tapestries. And Beacon Electric moved the electrical vault from the first to the third floor so it would no longer be a flood risk.

"Auld & White Constructors is honored to have been Florida Theatre's Construction Partner for its renovations and next-generation mechanical system upgrades," said Nate Marty, CEO of Auld & White Constructors."

"There were several things that were unique about the Florida Theatre project," said Jeff Greene, AIC-PA, executive chairman and founder of EverGreene Architectural Arts. "Like the mysterious connection to John Eberson, one of America's most prominent architects known for movie palace designs in the atmospheric theater style (the outdoor feel inside). The original four faux tapestries that hang in the Florida Theatre were painted. Since they are the same size and have the same imagery as the ones in the Tampa Theatre (which Eberson did), we were able to replicate them. When we did our forensic research and put all the theater finishes under the microscope, we realized they were painted with the

same paint and style that Eberson used. His signature, per se. It was fascinating to see what his influence did."

Greene added, "A big part of what we do at EverGreene is connect back to history. We wanted to return the Florida Theatre to its original, authentic self. When the building was renovated in the 1970s, they moved away from that a bit. We wanted to return as accurately as possible to what it looked like in 1927. The challenge was the short time frame we had. The surprise or mystery was the Eberson connection. But we did our research, added some interpretation, and found the harmony and balance we were striving for."

"As a lifelong resident of Jacksonville with many wonderful memories surrounding the Florida Theatre, this project has been a challenging opportunity for Beacon as well as an honor to be part of," said Shawn Heath, owner of Beacon Electrical Contractors.

"Over the last four years, by the end of this calendar year, we will have raised and spent \$15 million on building improvements to the historic Florida Theatre," said Numa Saisselin, president of the Florida Theatre. "After this, there's about \$8 million left of work to do to get the rest of the building where it needs to be, including expanding the entry lobby, a new artist hospitality space, dressing room improvements, marquee restorations and administrative office improvements."

According to Saisselin, the cherry on top would be bringing back the original vertical blade sign back that used to adorn the theater.

All of these projects, under the banner of the Centennial Capital Improvement Plan, which started in 2019, aim to prepare the historic Florida Theatre for its 100th birthday in 2027.

# HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES REMINISCE ABOUT FLORIDA-GEORGIA RIVALRY

The 2023 Florida-Georgia Hall of Fame class included Joe Haden and Earnest Graham from the University of Florida and Mark Richt and Terrence Edwards representing the University of Georgia.

They each had their chance during the induction ceremony on Oct. 27 to stand up at the podium in front of a room full of Gators and Bulldogs fans at Everbank Stadium and talk about some of the memories they had from one of college football's greatest rivalries.

Each story was unique and brought a smile to their face and in some cases laughs from those on stage and the crowd looking on.

Former Georgia head coach Mark Richt opened his speech by telling the crowd how he was trying to figure out why he was even invited to be a part of the hall of fame because his record was 5-10 story and photos by ANTHONY RICHARDS

against the Gators.

"I really don't have a clue why I'm here, but I'm thankful, because you know when you're a coach that if you get any type of accolade, it's because of the team," Richt said. "The coaches, players, administration and fanbase, all share a role in any success that I've had."

Richt gave the "true" story behind the famous touchdown celebration during the 2007 contest, when the entire Bulldogs' team ran onto the field, resulting in several excessive celebration penalties, but instantly took its spot in Bulldog lore.

According to Richt, he felt like his team needed some life put into them following a close victory against Vanderbilt the week before the Florida game, in which they needed a lastsecond field goal to win.

"I knew in two weeks we had the

Gators, so I told the offensive players that I wanted them to celebrate hard enough after the first touchdown to get a penalty," Richt said. "But as we're going through practices everything was pretty much an individual celebration, so then I was talking to the team the night before the game, and I told them I wanted it to be a team celebration."

It turned out Richt and his players had different views of the kind of celebration he was asking for.

"When I said team celebration, I'm thinking the 11 guys on the field, but they were thinking that meant everybody, the team, but I didn't know that," Richt chuckled. "So, we get to the game and the ref throws his hands up to signal touchdown and I see the guys start to celebrate, which is what I expected, but

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# ANYONE CAN BE A HERO AND SAVE A LIFE

### CPR training plays major role in child's outcome

Understanding what to do when encountered with someone suffering from a seizure is the first step in saving that person's life, and knowing these signs can make a hero out of anyone.

No one understands this more than 10-year-old St. Johns County resident Bryn Jenkins and her friend Mallory.

The two took part in a marine science camp in St. Augustine during the summer, but things quickly went from being fun times to a drastic situation when Bryn suffered a seizure while swimming in a pool during the camp's first day.

"I only remember a few seconds before I fainted in the water," Bryn said. "Everything started going black."

Fortunately, for Bryn the campers were taught how to perform CPR and recognize when someone was in distress.

The techniques learned earlier in the day were suddenly put to use by Mallory, who quickly noticed something was not right with Bryn and dove under to pull her body to the surface and helped her regain consciousness.

According to the American Red Cross, about 500,000 cardiac arrests occur each year, and CPR increases the likelihood of surviving cardiac arrest nearly doubles or triples the chances of survival when bystanders act, and the organization encourages everyone, not just health care workers and emergency responders, to take the CPR



course to learn it.

The quick reaction Mallory demonstrated is something that Bryn and her family are very grateful for.

After being notified of the incident, Bryn's mom, Nicole Jenkins, instructed first responders to transport her daughter to the Wolfson Children's Hospital Emergency Center at Baptist Medical Center South.

According to Nicole Jenkins, she knew the importance of children being treated by pediatric emergency physicians after spending years with Baptist Health as a content creator for the Wolfson Children's Hospital website.

The incident proved to be much more than just a seizure, as doctors found that Bryn had a rare heart rhythm disorder called long QT syndrome that was known to cause fast and chaotic heartbeats, which can lead to fainting and seizures.

That evening, Bryn was transported to Wolfson Children's Hospital by Kids Kare helicopter and admitted to the Cardiovascular Intensive Care Unit (CVICU) in the Borowy Family Children's Critical Care Tower, where an EKG and genetic testing confirmed the diagnosis.

"Her heart rate was all over the place. Even with her sitting still, it would go down to 35 beats per minute and then up to 120," Nicole Jenkins said. "It's crazy to know her heart has probably been doing that her whole life without us knowing."

Wolfson Children's C. Herman and Mary Virginia Terry Heart Institute is the only program in Jacksonville that provides a full range of cardiac services for adults and children like Bryn with congenital heart disorders. This includes outpatient evaluation of murmurs, detection of complex heart defects in fetal life and imaging and non-surgical procedures to diagnose and treat heart conditions.

"Pediatric electrophysiologists and interventional cardiologists associated with the Terry Heart Institute perform procedures on children with significant heart conditions and adults who need surgical correction of defects that they were born with," said Dr. Rajesh Shenoy, a fetal and pediatric cardiologist and medical director at Wolfson Children's Terry Heart Institute.

Bryn remained in the CVICU for observation for 10 days before undergoing a procedure to receive an implantable cardioverter-defibrillator, a life-saving device that acts as a pacemaker and a defibrillator to fix fast, abnormal heart rhythm.

Along with starting lifelong medication to help keep her heart rate stable, she had to wear an arm sling for several weeks after surgery to reduce movement around her incision.

While activities like sports and physical education classes are on hold, Bryn started her first year of middle school this fall and feels like herself again.

"I feel totally fine and back to normal," she said.

Bryn will continue yearly visits with the electrophysiology team at the Terry Heart Institute to monitor her progress and remains grateful for the care she continues to receive so close to home by the staff at Wolfson Children's.

Alaimo told the assembled donors and volunteers that they were an inspiration to the Board of County Commissioners. Alaimo, an advocate for

affordable housing, serves as the board's liaison with the Housing Finance Authority.

"The Titanic was built by professionals, but the Ark was built by volunteers," he said. "You are keeping people's dreams of homeownership afloat." Habitat's board treasurer Craig Carroll said that, in the past year alone, more than 200 volunteers provided more than 3,500 hours of labor and donors contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars.

One of those donors, Inez McDonald, donated \$100,000 toward a new, 36-home neighborhood being developed by the organization, Volusia Woods, which will be located in West Augustine.

Everson said McDonald has donated a total \$200,000 over the years in support of Habitat's work. McDonald was presented a street sign with her name on it in anticipation that one day the actual sign will be placed in the development.

Also recognized was St. Augustine Distillery and co-founders Michael Diaz and Philip McDaniel, for providing volunteers and sponsoring five homes.

Site Supervisor Beth Ellis recognized several volunteers.

Carroll reminded attendees that there was more work to do.

"We're all very well aware of the many challenges of affordable housing in our community," he said. "The need is great and growing. As we commemorate this milestone, let's remember our work is far from over." [ season of giving ]

Carlton has always brought up chefs through the ranks with a lot of mentorships, but the precarious nature of the industry was exposed during the pandemic.

Working in a kitchen feels like family. We work long hours at something we're all very passionate about. There are good days and challenging days, and if you don't feel the love for your work and trust your colleagues, you don't last long in this business.

I think there's work to do in opening up opportunities for people to see how great of a career this is and the opportunities that exist in hospitality in or beyond the kitchen. I'm also working with area high schools to encourage students to consider careers in culinary.

### Is there a certain approach vou take when creating a dish to be offered? Does it allow your creativity to come into play?

Creating new dishes is the best part of the job! This is where all the fun and creativity comes into play, and it's the part all chefs love.

From concept, I focus on seasonality, taking into account what style dish I am looking for, which ingredients are local to the area and what ingredients contrast or complement, being careful to balance flavors in every dish.

A single ingredient should never overpower a dish. It's like a song; the drums don't drown out the guitar and the guitar solo doesn't take over the song.

I also ask myself, "What story do the ingredients tell?" Travel is also an essential part of inspiration, keeping things

fresh and creative. My travels inform my cooking.



# WOMEN'S GIVING ALLIANCE CELEBRATES IMPACT OF STRATEGIC COLLECTIVE GIVING

On Oct. 18, The Women's Giving Alliance (WGA), an initiative of The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida, hosted its annual meeting at which more than 220 members gathered at UNF's University Center.

The meeting coincided with a 39% growth in membership to 470 women. This tremendous growth means more funding for women and girls in Northeast Florida.

"WGA is not only about pooling our dollars to have a strategic influence on our community, it's also about pooling our ideas, relationships and other resources from our diverse members to magnify our impact," said Sheila Collier, president of WGA. "Our membership continues to grow every year — and we are nearly 500 strong now — because women who want to

make a difference in our community recognize and embrace the power of strategic, collective giving."

During the meeting, WGA announced a new grant cycle focused on serving the fundamental needs of women and girls in Northeast Florida.

In December, local nonprofit organizations serving women and

girls will be able to apply for one-year grants for up to \$50,000 to meet the basic needs, such as food, shelter, childcare, health and safety, of women in girls living in the six-county area of Northeast Florida.

Since 2002, WGA has awarded more than \$8.9 million through 180 grants to more than 70 organizations in Baker, Clay, Duval, Nassau, Putnam and St. Johns counties.

During the meeting, WGA hosted several guest speakers who addressed the importance and impact of strategic giving.

Isaiah Oliver, the president of The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida, spoke about the importance of supporting women and girls as the father of three daughters.

"Strategic philanthropy is all about



then all of a sudden I felt this 'woosh' and it was the rest of the guys running by me to run out onto the field."

The emotional moment of the ceremony was when Richt, who has Parkinson's disease, finished his speech and as he walked away from the podium was given a standing ovation by everyone in attendance, both Georgia and Florida fans alike.

Joe Haden played in that game as a defensive back for the Gators and remembers that play well and how crazy the moment was.

"I was out on the field when they scored that touchdown, and it seemed like 3,000 Georgia players ran onto the field," Haden chuckled. "That was the one time on a football field when I was actually scared because I didn't know what was going on, and it is definitely a memory I will never forget."

Terrence Edwards was a wide receiver at Georgia from 1999 to 2002 and spoke about how he and his older brother Robert Edwards, who was a running back for the Bulldogs and joined the hall of fame in 2001, have had a competitive relationship their entire lives.

"We had this healthy competition growing up and everything that he did, I tried to do better," Edwards said. "Well now he can't say that he's the only one in the Georgia-Florida Hall of Fame."

For Earnest Graham, he mentioned how important it has been for he and his wife to strive to maintain a strong family unit and he was honored that his daughter, who is a junior at the University of Florida was in the crowd to witness the moment, and his son will be attending the university next year.

He mentioned how he was proud to be considered among the best in the rivalry's history.

"That's the mark of this game," Graham said. "Great players have to stand up and shine and be part of some of the biggest moments in SEC football. There's a story like that every year."

Ellen Wiss, past WGA president and current president and co-founder of READ USA. and David Garfunkel, president of LIFT JAX, led a discussion about how strategic philanthropy can manifest in unique ways to maximize community impact. Specifically, the duo addressed the origins of LIFT JAX, which began with WGA members seeking to target specific community needs.

"This organization stands as a remarkable example

of an all-sector collective impact effort," said Collier. "By conducting the necessary research and deeply evaluating what it revealed, LIFT JAX was able to identify specific needs in our community and initiate a movement of support. To see the impact this organization and others are having over time is a testament to the power of strategic, collective giving."

WGA leadership also outlined several initiatives aimed at growing and supporting its membership and a new strategic focus that will launch in 2025.

WGA grants are generated from members' yearly contributions (\$1,500 a year or \$750 for the first year if they are 40 and under), a portion of WGA's endowment fund and individual gifts.


