

Keystone purchase of Accotink Academy By The Sea falls through

School to close May 31

The recently announced purchase of Accotink Academy By the Sea by Keystone Child Development Center will not move forward as planned, both parties confirmed this week.

Accotink Academy By the Sea will now close May 31, as was initially planned at the start of this school year.

We want to express our heartfelt thank you and appreciation to the Ponte Vedra parents who allowed us to educate their children the last 18 years." said Mark McConnell, executive vice president for Accotink Academy, Inc. of Virginia, the Ponte Vedra Beach school's parent company. "Ponte Vedra will always be home to our family and while this is a sad ending for the academy, we hope Elaine's legacy lives on in our students, teachers and staff."

Last month, Keystone announced plans to purchase the school — which would become known as Keystone By The Sea — and continue with the existing Accotink Academy staff and administration along with some additions from its own staff. Enrollment was then opened for both summer and fall programs.



"A contract was executed and both parties agreed that enrollment should be opened for the 2016-2017 school year," Keystone Founder and CEO Dr. Katherine Falwell said. "However, during the period of due diligence, the parties could not reach an agreement on the final terms of sale."

McConnell noted that the contract negotiations did not involve Accotink Academy By The Sea or its parent company, as the property was privately owned by his parents, Warren McConnell, 95, and school founder Elaine Mc-Connell, who died in January.

In August 2015, McConnell said, his mother — then in failing health — had made the difficult decision to close Accotink Academy By The Sea and sell the property at the conclusion of the 2015-2016 school year following many years of operating losses.


"Because of my mother's passionate dedication to the school and the community, she took the losses year after year," he said.

After notifying the staff about the decision to close the school, McConnell said, two potential buyers for the property came forward, but the sale with Keystone did not close after the parties could not agree on the final

Falwell said that all parents have been notified that the sale will not

occur and all deposits that had been held in escrow were immediately refunded.

"Although we are extremely disappointed in the outcome, we remain committed to bringing the benefits of an exceptional preschool and child development center to families in the Jacksonville Beach and Ponte Vedra Beach areas," Keystone Founder and CEO Dr. Katherine Falwell said. "We are actively reviewing other properties and anticipate opening a Keystone By The Sea location in the near

Bishop Estévez ordains deacon Keegan to priesthood



Man will serve as vicar of Our Lady
Star of the Sea

David Keegan will serve as parochial vicar of Ponte Vedra Beach's Our Lady Star of the Sea Parish following his ordination to the priesthood this past weekend.

Bishope Felipe J. Estévez of the Diocese of St. Augustine ordained Keegan and Deacon Philip Timlin to the priesthood May 14 in a mass celebrated at the Cathedral Basilica in St. Augustine. Keegan, 40, is a Louisiana native who earned a degree in psychology from the University of Montevallo in Alabama.

While he originally planned to marry shortly after graduating from college, he and his fiancée called off their wedding plans and Keegan accepted a full-time job managing a restaurant in Birmingham. A year later, his sister was diagnosed with cancer. When she died in 2000, Keegan was at her bedside.

"I can see now how the Holy Spirit was preparing me for a vocation," Keegan said of that difficult time in his life

In 2002, Keegan moved to Jacksonville to be closer to his family, who had moved to the city. He had been working in restaurant management for eight years and dating, but felt something was missing. In 2006, a priest at St. Joseph Parish in Jackson-ville invited him to a Christ Renews his Parish retreat and he said it was from there his faith life really took off.

"I was in a relationship and discerning marriage, but as I grew deeper in the faith the thought of the priesthood returned," he said. "All those memories and desires came back and it was clear as could be. It was the deepest, realest call. It was what I had to do."

Keegan entered Miami's St. John Vianney College Seminary in 2009. Following his graduation two years later, he entered St. Vincent de Paul Regional Seminary in Boynton Beach to complete his formation and training.

"It's been an amazing, incredible journey," Keegan said. "I am constantly surprised by the love I receive from the people of the diocese — how open and generous they are. It's amazing."

Nancy Louise Spuria, a longtime resident of Ponte Vedra, died May 11, 2016. She was born October 10, 1937 in Newton, Mass.

In 1954, Nancy met the love of her life, Tony Spuria, on a blind date. In 1955, she graduated from Newton High School. After a brief stint at Gamewell Corporation (the



world's leading fire alarm box manufacturer), she and Tony were married in 1958, and have been inseparable ever since.

In 1959, Nancy and Tony started their family with the birth of Karen (the apple of Nancy's eye). Nancy's finest ac-

complishment, David, was born shortly after in 1960, and Joseph (the black sheep of the family whom Nancy adored) was born in 1963. As Tony embarked on his meteoric rise in the corporate world, Nancy served as CEO of Spuria Inc., setting up home in Newton, Mass.; Derwood, MD; Winston Salem, NC; San Antonio, TX; and Ponte Vedra; and raising two bright and beautiful children (Joe was not all that bright or beautiful).

Nancy is survived by her devoted husband, Tony; sons David (Deanna) and Joseph (Cindy); grandchildren Annie (Luigi), Alex, Matthew, Nikki and Henry; brother George (Connie); and sister Linda (Terri). 6 One of Us

If you watched any of THE PLAYERS coverage on television last week – or have watched any major professional sports coverage over the past two decades, for that matter – chances are you've seen the handiwork of Tommy Roy. As a producer with NBC Sports and Golf Channel, Roy has covered some of the seminal moments in sports history. A Marsh Landing resident, Roy describes some of the unique challenges of covering golf, especially the tournament held each year in his own back yard. — By Jennifer Logue

Tommy Roy

You've enjoyed a long career with NBC Sports. What are some of the more memorable sporting events you've covered?

I've had the great opportunity in my career to be the producer or executive producer of the Olympics, Super Bowl, World Series, NBA finals, a college football national championship game, Kentucky Derby, Daytona 500, Wimbledon, and golf's Players Championship, US Open and Ryder Cup, among others. Some of the more memorable moments from telecasts I produced are Michael Jordan's first three NBA titles, Super Bowl XXXII when John Elway finally won it, the 2008 U.S. Open when Tiger Woods won his last major - and did it while playing on a broken leg - and Michael Phelps' incredible exploits at the Beijing Olympics, where he won eight gold medals.

How is covering a golf tournament different than coordinating coverage of other sports, such as baseball or football? Is it easier or more difficult?

In baseball or football, as a producer, you are following one ball on one field. In golf, at any one time, there are up to 70 balls in play, on 18 different fields (holes), spread out over 50-plus acres. In team sports, they stop playing when TV goes to commercial, which gives the production team time to catch their breath. With golf, they don't stop playing when we go to break, forcing us to work even harder making sure we are recording the key shots. After the Olympics, because of the massive size of the production, golf is the next most difficult to cover.

How far in advance do you begin planning TV coverage for a tournament like THE PLAYERS? What sort of advance work is involved?

My planning began the day after last year's Players ended. Status quo, in my book, is never good enough, so we're always looking to improve. So we begin early work on graphics, our videotaped features and historicals, as well as preparing research for

our announcers.

Of course, on a production of this size our production and technical managers are dealing with logistical prep many months in advance.

How does THE PLAYERS stack up against other tournaments in terms of coverage? Does the Stadium Course's design play a factor in your production plans?

This is our largest, most technically advanced, golf event. The unique Pete Dye course design requires us to deploy more cameras than we normally do. For example, on the short par 3 17th, we need nine cameras to capture every angle of the island green and the players as they attempt to find land with their tee shots.

What are the technical and staffing requirements needed to cover a major tournament like THE PLAYERS?

We have 60-plus cameras and a technical, announce and production team of close to 200.

How has new technology changed the way golf is covered on television?

The miniaturization of our cameras and the use of fiber optic cables has allowed us to have more cameras, as well as have them more mobile.

And Hi Def has certainly improved the visual experience of the viewers by making the balls easier to follow and accentuating the stunning beauty of these courses.

From a producer's standpoint, do you enter a tournament with certain "story lines" in mind, or do you just wait and see how events unfold?

Again, golf is unique. If I were doing a Golden State game, Steph Curry is the story. Entering a tournament like The Players, we may think that particular golfers will be our stories, but because the field of contenders is so deep, any one of a hundred other players could lead, and we need to react accordingly.

What's the most challenging part of overseeing coverage of THE PLAYERS?

Keeping track of all the contenders and trying to show all of their shots, live. We're very fortunate that the PGA Tour has really limited the commercial interruptions, which gives us the time to set up and watch the leaders, shot by shot, as they make their way around this fantastic venue.

You worked for many years in New York. What drew you to Ponte Vedra?

Coming here every year to cover The Players, my wife, Anne, and I fell in love with the area. We started coming here for vacation, too. And when I started producing golf primarily, I was able live anywhere I wanted, and we chose Ponte Vedra immediately. Plus, it makes sense to live close to the PGA Tour. And because many of our events are in Florida, I can drive and avoid yet another airplane flight.

How do you enjoy spending your free time?

Well, with me being on the road so often, I enjoy spending time with my family. And, the game of golf happens to be my passion, so I play or practice whenever I have time.

Pros share importance of faith with youth golfers at annual 'Breakfast with the Pros'

PGA Tour golfer Ben Martin was riding high in his early 20s.

While still an amateur, Martin played in three major championships and was runner-up at the 2009 U.S. Amateur. In 2010, at age 23, he turned pro, won his second professional event and had qualified for the PGA Tour before the year was through.

Things were going great — until Martin suffered a number of setbacks during his rookie year and lost his tour

"Growing up, I thought golf was gonna be the thing that brought me

ultimate fulfillment in life," Martin told an audience of 400 local youth golfers last week. "I think God allowed me to have some early success so that he could show me golf is not what's going to fulfill me."

Martin was among a number of PGA Tour golfers who shared the importance of their faith with young golfers at the annual FCA Golf Jacksonville "Breakfast with the Pros." Hosted by Crosswater Community Church, the event brought young golfers and coaches together with professional golfers, who helped the junior golfers keep the sport in proper perspective.

"Faith gives you an identity outside of golf," said golfer Fred Funk, who called his 2005 THE PLAYERS Championship win at age 49 the highlight of his career. "We're all competitive. It may seem glamorous, but life on the tour is hard. It beats you down — all the work and the effort, the highs and lows.

"In a sport where you are your score," Funk continued, "it's so much easier when you have Christ and the Lord at your back."

Michele McManamon, chairman of this year's THE PLAYERS Championship, said that faith plays an integral role in tournament preparations.

"Our leadership team bases all that we do on prayer," she said. "We truly believe God has His hand in everything we're doing. We couldn't raise \$8.1 million for local charities last year without God, and we give Him all the glory."

At the breakfast, the Golf Channel's Todd Lewis interviewed several pro golfers, who talked about how their faith was critical to keeping them grounded in an ultracompetitive environment.

"For my wife and me, Christ is the backbone and motivation of everything we do," Jared Wolfe told students. "It's our constant in our life."

Kevin Streelman, meanwhile, recounted his concern about kids worshiping golfers and other athletes instead of God.

"I had seen kids out on the course and the way they looked at me like I was a celebrity," Streelman said. "It didn't seem right. I thought, 'Those eyes need to be on Christ."

To address that, Streelman helped create FCA Gameday, a program where kids walk the golf course with pros

who share their walk of faith.

"Each of us is given a platform, and it's up to us to use the platform we've been given to glorify the King," Streelman said. "One day, God will say to each of us, 'I gave you this gift, what did you do with it?' and I just want to be able to tell Him, 'I did my best."

And while professional sports may focus on winning and losing, the pros agreed, focusing on God helps them realize what's truly important.

"I'm fulfilled through Christ and what He did,' Martin said. "Ultimately I can rest in the knowledge that whether I win this tournament or not, I'm in good hands."

PGA Tour, Toby Keith salute armed forces at Military Appreciation Day

Good, old-fashioned American patriotism was on full display at THE PLAY-ERS Championship last week, when the PGA Tour and country music star Toby Keith paid tribute to the nation's military men and women at the tournament's annual Military Appreciation Day.

Held May 10 at the Stadium Course's legendary 17th hole, the event attracted thousands of residents and visitors, who cheered as military men and women marched onto the green to the strains of "God Bless America." As a giant American flag was slowly unfurled across the green, the crowd fell reverently silent as Byron Rowe, U.S. Navy retired, sang the National Anthem — only to break into cheers at the conclusion as the 125th fighter wing of the Florida Air National Guard roared overhead in a flyover salute.

U.S. Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Mark Welsh summed up the mood of the enthusiastic crowd.

"We have warriors, golf and Toby Keith," Welsh said. "It doesn't get any better than that."

Welsh, the event's keynote speaker, recognized his wife, Betty, who was sitting in the audience along with numerous military service men and women and their families.

"She represents thousands of spouses who are the foundation of what the military does," Welsh said. "Thank you for the life of service, sacrifice and support you give us."

Welsh said one of the best parts of his job as Air Force Chief of Staff is the opportunity to meet America's military men and women, particularly those who are serving in harm's way.

"They're out there doing their nation's business and they are proud to be there," he said. "They are the greatest people on earth."

Those sentiments were echoed by PGA Tour Commissioner Tim Finchem.

"I grew up in a military family — my dad was a career Marine for 30 years," Finchem said. "From him, I learned about honor, I learned about respect and I learned about service and sacrifice."

He stressed, moreover, that appreciating America's military shouldn't be something relegated to a few holidays or ceremonies each year. "We should show our support and admiration for those who fought to defend our freedom not just today, but every day."

Surprise proposal

A highlight of the Military Apprecia-

tion Day ceremonies came when K9s for Warriors Director of Operations Jason Snodgrass dropped to one knee and proposed to his girlfriend — and ex-wife — U.S. Army Specialist Rachael Maguire, who accepted as the crowd cheered

A former sergeant in the U.S. Army, Snodgrass endured a difficult transition back to civilian life, carrying both significant physical and psychological scars from his many combat search-andrescue missions in Iraq.

"It is hard to describe PTS to someone," Snodgrass told attendees. "It is hard to describe the feeling of isolation, of uncontrollable anxiety or the anger that just overtakes you. It's hard to describe to someone that you're afraid to go to sleep, afraid to drive a car, afraid to leave your home or walk into your own home for fear of being ambushed."

In 2012, Snodgrass began volunteering for K9s for Warriors, an activity he found both rewarding and therapeutic. He soon joined the staff as director of warrior operations.

"There are so many things I credit for helping to give me my life back — my family, K9s for Warriors, and of course, Rachael," he said. "If you're a soldier or veteran dealing with post-traumatic stress, please know that there is help and hope. You are not alone. I got help and you can, too."

All-American Toby

After a brief intermission, the crowd was ready for the evening's entertainment.

"This is a man who knows the meaning of military appreciation," the announcer said. "Raise your red solo cup for a great American — Toby Keith!"

Keith, who has performed more than 230 shows for America's military, took to the stage and launched into "American Ride," "I Love this Bar" and countless other hits to an all-ages crowd that was ready to party.

Cyd and David Ferris were first-time attendees at THE PLAYERS, having just moved to Del Webb Ponte Vedra from San Francisco.

"We think it's great!" David Ferris said. "We've been here all afternoon!"

For students Claire Gibney, Halie Rash, Tanner Cormier and Dexter Carter Jr., though, THE PLAYERS is an annual event

"We come every year," Gibney said.
"We're all in college now, so this is like a reunion for us."

The Palms implements new method for memory loss

The route to Janice Reaves' office is marked by halls painted sorbetorange and mint green, fresh flower arrangements and vintage memorabilia from the late 1920s through the early 1950s. It's the first thing visitors see when they make their way to The Palms' memory care unit.

The decor is part of Reaves' use of the Montessori method as part of The Palms' memory care program. The goal, the assistant activity director of memory care said, is to help residents suffering from diseases such as Alzheimer's by focusing on the things they're able to do and activities that re-familiarize them with their lives.

Since its inception in the early 20th century, the Montessori method (named for its creator, Maria Montessori) has been best known as a teaching method for children. But its principles — considering the needs, interests and capabilities of the individual while still challenging them and providing the opportunity to learn — hold true for engaging those with Alzheimer's and dementia,

What I try to do is transfer those ideas into health care and assisted living," said Reaves, who joined The Palms in February. "And this method focuses on what individuals can still achieve and not on what's been lost."

Reaves said the memory care program incorporates both motor skills and memory jogging - activities that use sorting, bundling and organizational skills — with her own added twist of sentimentality to spur collaboration and encourage engagement. The idea is to constantly stimulate the senses to help individuals rediscover and remember their world.

Each activity consists of skills used on a daily basis, such as sorting and categorizing, grasping, pulling and pushing, cooking, wrapping and bundling. The difference with the Montessori method, she said, lies in


engaging each individual with an activity that has a tangible accomplishment. For Reaves' group, that could mean choosing and arranging flowers that later decorate the memory care unit's dining tables for dinner, or completing puzzles that gradually increase in difficulty in a certain amount of time. For example, Reaves may have residents sort swatches of fabric according to color or material, or ask them to identify objects and inventions that have changed their own lives to help them recall things with which they're familiar.

"It's a bit like occupational therapy, but there's a beginning, middle and end to the activities as opposed to producing no results," Reaves said. "And what I try to do is use things they'll be familiar with – things that will help them be reminded of special events and celebrated moments in their own lives."

That means in addition to short trips to places like the nearby bird sanctuary and visits from two therapy dogs, day-to-day activities consist of things that residents knew and enjoyed while growing up in the 1940s and 1950s: listening to records on a phonograph, sorting and polishing ornamental buttons, arranging flowers or folding clothes. Occasionally, Reaves brings in her own collection of antique dolls.

"By doing things like polishing the chrome of a cookware set or wrapping pennies, bundling baby socks — they're reminded of doing those things in the past," she said. "But instead of just going through those motions, they're creating something with a process. They can see what they've created and feel proud of the accomplishment."

Those feelings of accomplishment and progress are cornerstones for the Montessori philosophy. "It's a very lonely disease," Reaves explained. "And it can be scary. Often times

there will be individuals who, at first, don't want to take part in the activity. But then they see the people around them doing it and they feel encouraged to participate, too."

Executive Director Barbara Mattison believes The Palms' memory care unit will continue to grow and help more people and families cope with memory loss.

"This method allows (residents) to engage with their families and with one another to basically enjoy their lives again," she said. "It's been really moving to see

"This disease affects the whole family," she continued. "But here, we try to help families learn to deal with that. And since (the program) has started, it's been amazing to see how much it's helped."



Classic cars greeted guests as they arrived at the new Arbor Terrace San Jose, located at 3760 Dupont Ave. in Jacksonville. Guests also enjoyed entertainment from a jazz trio along with a variety of hors d'oeuvres, wine and Tom Collins cocktails in keeping with the event's theme.

Licensed for 70 residents, the facility follows the model of Arbor Terrace's Ponte Vedra and Ortega locations, with different "neighborhoods" for people at various stages of memory loss.

"The separate neighborhoods enable residents with similar memory acuity to live together, and allows for engagement and care to be tailored to their needs," said John Carey of Whitehall Realty Partners, which developed the property in conjunction with The Arbor Co.

Carey said Arbor Terrace's three facilities help fill a need for dedicated memory care in the Jacksonville area. "We were very purposeful in selecting locations throughout the Jacksonville area where we thought there was a great need," he said

So much so, Carey added, that a dozen residents were already set to move in as soon as the facility opened.

Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra to celebrate first anniversary

Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra will celebrate its one-year anniversary next month with a reception to benefit the Alzheimer's Association.

While the facility will officially mark its first anniversary on June 8, the decision was made to connect the anniversary celebration with the "The Longest Day" campaign, a team event to raise funds and awareness for the Alzheimer's Association held annually on the longest day of the year. To that end, Arbor Terrace will mark its anniversary June 20 with a wine and cheese party, silent auction and a musical performance by Priscilla Johnson, daughter of an Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra resident.

"We figured that this is a great opportunity because of the specialty that we serve," Executive Director John Schaum said. "It's a good correlation for us to be very involved with the Alzheimer's Association along with being able to bring awareness to our public and also provide opportunities to raise some money for them and their research."

Dedicated memory care

Located on Palm Valley Road, the assisted living facility focuses solely on serving residents with Alzheimer's or other forms or dementia, with a total of 52 apartments for 64 residents.

Executive Director John Schaum said

that over the past year, the facility has seen steady growth, both in residents and staff.

"We really look at our growth and try to space it out as much as we possibly can to be able to grow it at a steady rate so that our residents and families that are moving in can get acclimated," said Schaum, noting that the facility is currently about 65 percent full.

Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra is part of the Arbor Company, which along with local developer Whitehall Realty Partners opened Arbor Terrace Ortega in 2013, followed by Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra, and the newly opened Arbor Terrace San Jose (see accompanying story). The Arbor Company approach involves keeping memory care communities small in order to provide the most personal care to each resident.

All Arbor Terrace staff participate in an exclusive multilevel cognitive care education program and cognitive care training program specifically designed to teach how to positively interact with those with memory loss. The Engaged Living program, meanwhile, focuses on meeting individual needs of residents and is designed to enrich residents' health and spirit.

"Our Engaged Living program is a huge piece of what makes Arbor Terrace so different from everybody else," Senior Care Counselor Ilene Thrasher said. "Engaging that resident activity, providing socialization, providing structure to those residents every single day is what keeps that brain at an even level and hopefully not allow it to deteriorate so quickly."

As memory loss progresses, Thrasher noted, different parts of the brain are affected, such as the language-based left-side of the brain, but rhythm, which is on the right-side of the brain, is something that dementia and Alzheimer's sufferers never lose. Because of that, music plays a large part in in the daily activities of Arbor Terrace residents. As part of the Music and Memory program, each resident has a personal iPod customized with his or her favorite music.

"Studies have shown that music is very comforting to a resident — particularly if it's some variety of music that they are very familiar with," Schaum said

Another program designed to bring comfort to the residents is the Namaste program. Accompanied by a staff member in a peaceful, self-contained area, residents experience therapies such as massage or aromatherapy as a non-chemical intervention to help residents relax.

Arbor Terrace also holds community education and outreach events through community partnerships with the Ponte Vedra YMCA, The Plantation at Ponte Vedra Beach, and Nocatee's Del Webb community. Among the programs the facility has made available to the public is the Virtual Dementia Tour, a sensoryaltering experience where participants can physically experience what life is like for those living with dementia or Alzheimer's.

"All of our staff are required to go through this virtual dementia tour, but we encourage the community to come in and go through it as well so the families really do understand what their loved ones are going through every single day of their lives," Thrasher said. "It's pretty powerful."

Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra also offers a "Life Enrichment Group" where dementia sufferers who are being cared for in the home can meet, engage and socialize twice a week while their caregivers and loved ones enjoy a brief respite. The group meets from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays.

"I think we're beginning to establish ourselves in the community as a provider for people who suffer from dementia and Alzheimer's," Schaum said. "I'm proud to say that feedback has been very positive in regards to the relationship with our community and helping our community be able to provide the care, treatment and guidance they may need for a loved one."




on one. A Jacksonville native, Bailey recently returned to the area after providing similar services in Ohio.

What to consider when choosing an assisted living facility

America is a graying nation. Each day, 10,000 Americans turn 65, and as people continue to live longer lives, it's predicted that by 2050 89 million Americans will be senior citizens.

That trend has more people considering assisted living as an option for their later years. The sheer number and variety of assisted living facilities, however, can make the selection process daunting, particularly for older individuals or couples faced with leaving their longtime home for unfamiliar surroundings.

What factors should people consider when selecting an assisted living facility? Dave Stieglitz of Oasis Senior Advisors in Jacksonville suggested that those involved in selecting a facility for themselves or loved ones keep the following mind:

Health needs

Does the person or couple have special medical, physical or cognitive health concerns? "Assisted living in Florida operates under three different licensing levels," Stieglitz explained. "Matching current or future needs to the correct licensing level should be a top priority."

Security

If there are cognitive issues, can the prospective resident function with assistance in a fairly open environment, or would they require a more secure facility to prevent wandering? Some assisted living facilities, for example, specialize in caring for individuals with Alzheimer's disease or other forms of dementia.

Culture

In what type of environment does the person thrive? Would he or she enjoy an active, social environment with a variety of activities from which to choose? Or would a more subdued environment be preferable?

Independence level

Is the person capable of getting around on his or her own initiative, or is prompting required? "Medium-sized communities can be much more personalized, with 'eyes' on their residents," Stieglitz noted.

Financial issues

Prospective assisted living residents should weigh the advantages and disadvantages of a buy-in community versus a rental community. It also helps to be aware of the various forms of funding available for senior residential care. For example, is the person or a spouse a U.S. veteran? If so, he or she may be eligible for VA benefits to help with the cost of assisted living. Another financial point to consider: Is there room in the budget for additional care charges if the person's health declines? "If funds and resources are limited," Stieglitz said, "it's important to understand how Medicaid works and to know which assisted living communities accept Medicaid."

Research with caution

While the Internet is a helpful and convenient resource, Stieglitz said, many sites can capture your data, resulting in an overwhelming flood of marketing calls from facilities that don't suit the potential resident's needs.

"Assisted living communities are as different as the colors of the rainbow in terms of services, size, price culture and environment," said Stieglitz, a certified senior advisor. "A free, local placement service professional can help people identify their needs up front, then accompany them on tours of those communities that most closely match their requirements. It can be the 'easy button' in this very critical and complex process."

To help support the program, businesses and community members can become "rider heroes," sponsoring riders for the average annual cost of \$200.



Senior Bistro delivers healthy, home-cooked meals

Food delivery service's menu designed with seniors in mind

As services for seniors continue to grow, one area that is sometimes overlooked has been that of food delivery — and while many restaurants offer that service, few do so specifically with seniors in mind.

Working to alleviate that issue is the team behind Senior Bistro, a food delivery service created with seniors' nutritional needs in mind.

That distinction comes courtesy of its owners, Brian McWilliams and Jane and Chris Merritt — all of whom have medical backgrounds — and professional chef Lori Thomas. As the first anniversary of their business nears in July, they hope their distinctive service remains a testa-

ment to their qualifications.

"What makes us different is that we cater to seniors specifically," Jane Merritt said. "Anyone can receive our meals, but we try to keep our meals heart healthy while being mindful of any blood or health problems, so the food is more suited for them."

Merritt said she and her husband, both registered nurses, had been working in health care for years and recognized a lack of food-delivery options for seniors

"We both felt there was a need and that purpose just sort of overcame my husband," Merritt said. "In that same time, I developed an extreme love of food and cooking. We both wanted to have more of a purpose and give back to the community and decided to contribute to helping seniors."

And as a gerontology-certified nurse with more than 17 years of experience in health care, Merritt was qualified to help.

Senior Bistro is distinguished by its special focus on the nutritional needs of the seniors they service through complimentary "spot checks," wherein each client's needs are assessed to determine cognitive orientation, risk of injury and nutritional needs and concerns. The business doubles as an outreach to put clients and their families in touch with the resources they need to help them maintain independence in their homes.

"A lot of our seniors are homebound and don't have a lot of choices in food," Merritt said. "So our homebound seniors have been able to receive meals they enjoy the taste of and that are healthy. We're also able to refer our seniors to resources for things like mental health counseling and private-duty home health should they need it."

In many cases, she added, accessibility to food can be the one thing that allows a client to stay in their home.

"For our customers in particular, it's necessary to help them age in place," Merritt said. "And there's a surprising amount of people who are extremely homebound and struggle to get food into their homes."

Merritt said in the future they would like to expand the service as demand grows, focusing first on the Greater Jacksonville area and moving to outlying counties next. Eventually, they hope to take the service to a national level.

But for now, the team is happy to make a difference where they are.

"We really hope that seniors enjoy a service that helps meet their needs because we want them to age happily in place," she said. "So many seniors dread the thought of having to give up their homes and want to be able to stay where they are. We just hope we're able to help them do that with Senior Bistro." Becoming heart-healthy can reduce seniors' risk of stroke

Every 40 seconds someone in the U.S. suffers from a stroke. The risk is especially high for those 65 and older, with nearly 75 percent of strokes occurring among this population.

May is American Stroke Month, and

it's an important time to gain a better understanding of this medical emergency and how it can be prevented.

What many may not know is the strong connection between stroke and heart disease—and

how taking care of your heart can lower your stroke risk.

The link between heart and brain

Because the brain needs oxygenrich blood pumped by the heart, these two organs are directly connected. By definition, a stroke occurs when blood flow to the brain is abruptly interrupted, due to a blood clot creating a blockage or a blood vessel rupturing. Simply put, the more effectively your circulatory system operates, the lower your risk of stroke.

Two heart conditions that are tied closely to stroke are high blood pressure and atrial fibrillation (AFib), the most common type of abnormal heart rhythm. According to the American Heart Association, 75 percent of people

who experience a stroke for the first time have high blood pressure. It is a major cause of stroke because it gradually thickens, narrows and damages the arteries in the neck, head and brain.

High blood pressure can lead to "ischemic" strokes — which make up about 85 to 90 percent of strokes in the United States. An ischemic stroke is caused by lack of blood flow to the brain due to a blood clot or narrowing of blood vessels.

Because nearly 80 million Americans live with high blood pressure, it contributes to the majority of strokes. AFib, however, is a more potent risk factor, increasing stroke risk by five times. The arrhythmia can cause the upper chambers of the heart to lose contraction, allowing blood to pool and potentially creating clots that could travel to the brain.

Both conditions are serious and should be evaluated and treated by a medical professional.

Lowering your stroke risk

The good news is that leading a heart-healthy lifestyle that includes regular physical activity and a low-fat diet can not only diminish stroke risk but also improve your overall health. Adults should aim for at least 150 minutes of exercise per week, and focus on a diet high in fruits, vegetables and whole grains, and low in salt and fat. Alcohol should be limited to one drink per day for women and two drinks per day for men.

One of the most important factors in lowering stroke risk is to quit smoking. According to the National Stroke Association, smoking can double the risk of stroke compared to non-smokers.

Another important part of a hearthealthy lifestyle is regularly seeing a doctor to monitor your heart and figure out the best plan for you. For those with high blood pressure, always take medication as instructed and use a home blood pressure monitor to keep track of your progress.

Knowing the symptoms

Ideally, you can reduce your risk of stroke by managing your heart health, but recognizing the warning signs of stroke can still protect both yourself and your loved ones. Catching a stroke early and getting medical attention can not only save a life but also reduce the long-term negative effects.

F.A.S.T. is a simple way to remember the signs: face drooping, arm weakness and speech difficulty. If you notice these three symptoms, it's "time" to call 911.

As you age, potential medical problems can seem overwhelming. By preparing yourself with the right knowledge and taking preventative actions, you will have a better chance of keeping yourself on the right side of the statistics.

Baptist Jacksonville launches new clinical stroke trials

Baptist Jacksonville is conducting two new stroke trials at the Stroke & Cerebrovascular Center at Baptist Medical Center Jacksonville. The trials, DAWN and POSTIVE, use devices and medications to potentially help stroke victims past the window for minimally invasive treatment.

"Through our clinical trials, someone who has a stroke in our community has access to treatments that are potentially very impactful for preservation of their quality of life," said Dr. Eric Sauvageau, director of the Stroke & Cerebrovascular Center at Baptist Jacksonville. "The clinical trials also help define the new frontier of stroke treatment."

According to the American Heart Association/American Stroke Association, approximately 795,000 Americans suffer

a new or recurrent stroke each year. On average, a stroke occurs every 40 seconds and is the fifth leading cause of death, taking nearly 129,000 lives a year. Stroke is also the leading cause of long-term disability.

Through the two new clinical trials, DAWN and POSTITIVE, doctors hope to reduce those numbers by providing endovascular intervention to ischemic stroke patients, who currently can't get tissue plasminogen activator, or tPA. The only FDA-approved treatment for ischemic strokes, tPA works by dissolving the clot and improving blood flow to the part of the brain being deprived of blood flow. With an endovascular intervention procedure, neurovascular surgeons can use a stent retriever device to remove the bold clot. The device can go into the

blood vessel through the groin and up to the brain to unblock the vessel.

Currently, the standard of care for interventional treatment is within six hours after the start of stroke symptoms, but the DAWN trial will explore using the stent retriever between six and 24 hours after a stroke has occurred.

The POSTIVE trial also uses devices and medications approved by the FDA for opening clotted blood vessels, but will explore treatment options up to 12 hours after symptoms first began. Patients for the trial are selected based on special advanced imaging that is new to Baptist and shows how much of the brain is still viable.

Dr. Ricardo Hanel, director of the Baptist Neurological Institute at Baptist Jacksonville, said the two trials are particularly beneficial for people who wake up with a stroke and do not know when the symptoms first occurred. For those patients, clot buster medications are not an option since the medication must be provided within 4.5 hours of symptoms occurring in order to be effective, he said.

Currently, Baptist Health has more than 20 clinical trials for stroke and aneurysms

"Having clinical trials ongoing allows us to be on the cutting edge of new concepts, techniques and technologies," said Dr. Hanel, who is also the primary international investigator on some of the trials. "What it means for the patient is they have first-hand access to what are the latest and potentially the greatest technology before anyone else in the country."





Exploring keys to longevity

Longevity, the length or duration of human lives, is an intriguing topic that has been studied by numerous researchers. Many methods or strategies have been proposed to increase the average human lifespan, but finding concrete evidence of what works and what doesn't is often challenging.

In most cases, living a longer life is a multidimensional achievement that involves avoiding disease and disability, keeping high levels of physical and cognitive function, and staying engaged in social, leisure and other productive activities. The search to understand the secrets of longevity is more than simply about discovering how to live longer; it is also about how to live a healthier, happier and more meaningful life. Studying regions of the world where people live measurably longer lives can provide us all with some important insights on keys to meaningful longevity.

These regions have been labeled "blue zones" by two researchers, Gianni Pes and Michel Poulin, who used it to describe longevity hotspots — regions of the world that produce the greatest concentration of centenarians. Residents of these areas are known to experience fewer life-reducing diseases and enjoy longer, healthier lives. Blue zones are scattered across the globe in towns in Japan, Italy, Costa Rica, Greece and the United States.

Even though these locations are separated by thousands of miles, blue zone residents appear to share the following lifestyle factors: they do not smoke, they place a priority on family, they participate in moderately strenuous physical activity every day, they stay socially connected and engaged, and, though exceptions exist, they consume a diet centered around fruits, vegetables and whole grains.

Smoking and longevity

Smoking status is a common thread that binds blue zone groups, and not surprisingly, is extremely rare among centenarians. Smokers in any culture live fewer years than nonsmokers, though even longtime smokers can benefit from smoking cessation so it is never too late to quit!

An emphasis on family and social connectedness

All blue zone groups place great significance on family time and to-



getherness, and they put family ahead of their other problems or concerns.

Family-related factors that nurture longevity include spending a significant amount of time with your children, engaging in a loving, monogamous relationship, and keeping your aging parents close by. Social connectedness, or a sense of belonging in a community, helps blue zone residents in times of crisis or distress. Benefits of this permanent support network include reduced anxiety during stressful life events, a sense of belonging and purpose in the world — all factors that have a positive impact on health.

Regular physical activity

Moderately strenuous physical activity is an intimate part of daily life in blue zone groups. Walking, gardening, tending herds and other manual tasks are built into the daily schedule, keeping many blue zone individuals in a state of near-con-

stant movement or motion. Increased physical activity levels are essential in boosting longevity, though researchers sometimes disagree on the intensity with which this exercise should be performed. Your health care professional can give you the best advice on what level will benefit you most as an individual.

A healthy diet

Blue zone diets are largely plant-based and include plenty of nuts, beans, greens, and whole grains. Some Blue zone diets also include a small amount of meat or fish as well as cheese and red wine. Blue zone members' increased consumption of vegetables and unprocessed foods provides them with natural antioxidants and other nutrients that may help prevent chronic disease.

To stay as active and healthy as possible, consider making some changes to your diet and exercise regime, but consult with your health care provider first before doing anything drastic, particularly regarding exercise. Certainly if you smoke, remember that it is never too late to quit and experience the health benefits associated with a non-smoking lifestyle. If you find you are lacking connectivity to family due to distance, consider establishing social connections through golf or tennis or through programs at the local library or senior center. Let's take the lessons learned from the blue zone groups and apply what we can to our own lives in order to not only live longer lives, but happier and healthier ones as well.

Green Room Brewing offers Beer Mutts dog treats

Shortly after Green Room Brewing opened its doors in Jacksonville Beach in June 2011, the idea of making dog treats from the brewery's spent grain was born.

"My son, Eric, had just started the brewery, and he was taking the grain out of the mash tank," said Debra Logeson, whose son, Eric Luman, owns and operates Green Room Brewing along with her brother, Mark Stillman. "Green Room is very big into sustainability, so we were talking about what could we do with some of this grain."

Luman mentioned the possibility of making dog treats, so Logeson set to work on making treats for her son's dogs. Later, it was suggested that she sell the dog treats, and the business just grew from there, she said.

Logeson makes the treats in small batches in her home kitchen in Gainesville. It's a slow process — it takes between eight to 10 hours to completely dehydrate each batch of treats. The dog treats come in three basic flavors: peanut butter, pumpkin and pizza. Occasionally, Logeson will experiment with seasonal flavors, such as blueberry or strawberry. Flour, eggs, spring water and natural flavoring are added

to the spent grain to make the treats.

"I haven't found one yet that my dog Kai won't eat," said Logeson. Kai, a Labrador retriever/shepherd mix, is the unofficial "quality control officer" — all treats must meet his approval.


Logeson, who is retired, said she mainly makes the dog treats for fun, selling them under the company name Logerhead Naturals, LLC. The treats cost \$5 per bag.

Beer Mutts dog treats have been well received by Green Room's patrons.

"They love it," Logeson said. "We're getting more and more popular at festivals and people are starting to call and ask for them." she said, adding that someone visiting from New York bought some treats to take home with them and liked them so much, they called Logeson and asked her to ship some additional bags to them.

She has also sold the treats at festivals such as the Kanapaha Spring Garden Festival in Gainesville, the Cedar Key Seafood Festival, the Jacksonville Home & Patio Show, and a festival at Jacksonville's Dog Wood Park. But Green Room is still the most popular place for purchasing the treats.

"They go well at Green Room," Logeson said. "People can bring their dogs in there; it's pet friendly, so that's my best seller right there."

First Coast No More Homeless Pets opens second veterinary facility

First Coast No More Homeless Pets (FCNMHP) opened the doors to its second location May 9 with a ribbon-cutting event celebrating its new veterinary facility.

Donors and local pet owners were welcomed to the grand opening, where Executive Director Rick DuCharme cut the ribbon with assistance from Dr. Charles Moreland, director of community affairs for Mayor Lenny Curry; Petco National Adoption Program Manager Karen Meader; and major donors Mary Lou Russell and Joseph A. Strasser. Meader presented a check worth \$292,500 on behalf of the Petco Foundation in support of the veterinary hospital and FCNMHP's Super- and Mega-Adoption events.

As part of the celebration, FC-NMHP offered a free rabies vaccine and exam to the first 500 clients whose pets carried a city license to receive it. Guests were also treated to a tour of the facility's Mary Lou Russell Animal Welfare Complex and the Joseph A. Strasser Veterinary Hospital.

The new 10,000-square-foot facility can serve up to 300 pets daily with 12 exam rooms, a dental lab, two surgery suites, a pharmacy, an



in-house lab, an intensive care unit, isolation rooms and grooming ser-

DuCharme said the new facility can serve triple the number of pets of the organization's current clinic on Norwood Avenue, and is an important service to bring to an area where few pet-care options exist.

"When you look at the map from I-10 all the way north to I-95, there's only one other place where people can go for quality pet care," DuCharme said. "It's almost a desert for veterinary care. With our type of medicine, we try and do high quality and high volume at a low cost and give owners a variety of options to treat their pets depending on what they can afford."

Ducharme noted that the new facility makes pet-care services available for approximately 40 percent less than the fees charged by the average veterinarian.

"We've realized that people would come to us having only a certain amount of money after visiting other clinics where they were unable to afford a service or a surgery that their pet needed," he said. "Our services and staff are able to do similar surgeries and procedures for less money. So we hope to save people money and pets' lives."

Proceeds from the operation of the veterinary hospital will also go toward other FCNMHP programs, including targeted spay and neuter surgeries, large adoption events and the Jacksonville Pet Food Bank.

Located at 464 Cassat Ave. in Jacksonville, the new facility is open 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday. Appointments may be made by calling (904) 425-0005.







Scott highlights strong state economy at PLAYERS' Governor's Reception

Florida's economy continues to gain steam thanks to policies that limit taxes and regulation and promote job creation and growth, Gov. Rick Scott told local business and community leaders at an economic development reception held May 12 at THE PLAYERS' Stadium Village.

Scott welcomed guests to THE PLAYERS and stressed that Florida's economy continues to provide strong incentives for businesses and residents to relocate to the Sunshine State.

"We are growing way faster than the rest of the country," said Scott, noting that he had recently returned from trips to California and Louisiana as part of his administration's efforts to encourage businesses there to come to Florida.

County Commissioner Jeb Smith — who joked that he is often mistaken for Scott - said St. Johns County has benefited from Scott's leadership and now boasts the second-lowest unemployment rate in the state at 3.5 percent. With a strong agricultural base in the southwest part of the county, the tourism draw of St. Augustine and golfing events like THE PLAYERS in Ponte Vedra, Smith said, St. Johns County has a diversified economic base that has attracted businesses such as Advanced Disposal and D.R.

"As a business owner, I want to thank you," Smith told Gov. Scott. "You have proven that a conservative approach to government is a template for success."

Tesori Family Foundation holds All-Star Kids Clinic at Sawgrass Country Club

The Tesori Family Foundation hosted an All-Star Kids Clinic at Sawgrass Country Club May 11.

Scheduled to coincide with the 2016 THE PLAY-ERS Championship, the golf clinic for children with special needs took place the evening before this year's tournament officially began. Through the event, 25 special needs children were paired with a coach who helped the child practice different golf drills, such as working on their backswing and putting.

Taking time out of their busy schedules to participate in the event were PGA Tour golfer Jordan Spieth and Jacksonville Jaguars quarterback Blake Bortles, both of whom also have foundations that assist children with developmental disabilities. Joining with the professional athletes were 20 coaches from The First Tee of North Florida as well as volunteers from the community.

Sawgrass Country Club Director of Golf Greg Lecker said it was an easy decision to say yes to the Tesoris when they first contacted him about hosting the golf clinic.

"From my perspective as a golf pro, introducing 25 kids to the game of golf and getting them to see this environment – getting to share that with them is such a special thing," Lecker said. "To wrap your arms around the Tesoris and the things they stand for, it's not hard. This is easy."

Founded in 2009, the Tesori Family Foundation supports both local and nationalthroughout the year. The

idea for the All-Star Golf Clinic came about after the 2014 birth of the Tesoris' son, Isaiah, who has Down syndrome. Paul Tesori credits his wife, Michelle, with coming up with the idea for the golf clinic to give children with special needs a chance to participate in the sport of golf – the sport that shaped Tesori's life.

Tesori noted that playing golf is something that anyone can do at any age. After hosting previous All-Star Kid clinics in Greensboro, NC and seeing the kids who participated smiling from ear to ear, he added, he was hooked.

Last week's event at TPC Sawgrass was the first time the Tesoris have hosted the event in Ponte Vedra.

"It means everything to us," Tesori said. "Number one, this is my home town, this is where the foundation was formed and it first started."

Jason Day wins THE PLAYERS

Jason Day, world No. 1, played almost like Tiger Woods in closing out the 2016 PLAYERS Championship, winning by four shots after leading from wireto-wire. All week, he throttled back his length advantage, using 2-iron and 3-wood off the tees, in order to overcome the treacherous angles of the golf course. He outplayed the legendary Pete Dye. And boy, did he set records.

He tied the low 18-hole score with his 9-under 63, now shared with five players.

He set the new, low number for the first 36 holes, at 15-under, at 129; previously 14-under, 130, set Greg Norman in

He tied the low start by a winner with Greg Norman and Martin Kaymer.

He set the new largest 36-hole lead of 4 shots, previously 3, by Lanny Wadkins and Greg Norman.

According to Day, he's just getting started.

"It's very stressful being the number one player in the world," Day said. "You're in the limelight a lot. You've got more things to do when you get to tournaments, more things to do off weeks. But I wouldn't change it in any way because this is exactly where I want to be, and I want to try and stay here as long as I can while I can, because nothing beats this feeling."

Clearly overcoming the best field in golf on a very difficult golf course is extra satisfying to the world No.1.

Thursday

The first round of The Players had all kinds of fireworks, highlighted by Jason Day's course record-tying 63. It wasn't like he had a six-shot lead, however, when he finished. Justin Rose, Bill Haas, Brendan Steele, Steve Lowrey and Cameron Tringale were all just two back at

7-under, and another group that included Ernie Els was at 6-under. Still, it tied the record held by Fred Couples (1992), Greg Norman (1994), Martin Kaymer (2014) and Roberto Castro.

Day was aware of the number to beat. "Once I got to 7, then I started thinking about the course record," he said after the round. "Birdieing 7, then I'm like, okay, I think I can birdie 8 and 9 and that'll kind of clip the course record. It would be nice to shoot 10-under."

Nice? It would have been truly amazing. Most people are closer to 62 for nine holes, never mind 18.

Shane Lowry posted a new back-nine record of 29.

Big names struggled. Adam Scott had a quadruple-bogey 8 on the 18th hole and Jordan Spieth suffered a double-bogey 7 on No. 9, his last hole of the day.

Jason Day looked like a vintage Tiger Woods Friday, posting 66 to follow his initial round of 63. At 15-under par, it looked like the Greg Norman record of 24-under par was within reach.

Colt Knost came within a shot of posting a new course record of 62, but it was not to be. He missed a four-footer on the 18th for par which would have done it. Nerves make golfers do unfortunate things

Rory McIlroy posted a 66 of his own, tying the lowest 9-hole score on the back nine of 28 which was held solo by Martin Kaymer since 2014.

Will Wilcox had a hole-in-one at 17th, and he went appropriately nuts for maybe 60 or 90 seconds. Really nuts. It's worth a YouTube search.

Two-time U.S. Open Champ Andy North, now working for ESPN, recalled that in the early years, the course was wilder, less tamed than it is now. He said it was significantly harder. There were grasses growing out of some of the bunkers, which were waste bunkers then. He said there were palmettos everywhere on the course, and balls hit into them just plain never saw the light of day again.


A lightning delay stopped play shortly after 4 p.m. The leaders and several other groups went back out but did not finish until Saturday morn-



Day hung on to his lead by his toenails.

Gone was the chance to break the Norman record as Day posted 1-over par on a day when the average score was 75.592. It was the fifth-highest average score in tournament history, including those years at Sawgrass Country Club.

Greens were overly fast, out-of-hand, and that's an understatement. Pins were set on mounds instead of flats, making the best players in the world look a little silly. They were not amused. Jason Day fourputted from 20 feet at the 6th.

Even with the high scores, Day had a four-shot advantage at the end of the round.

"I want to win this tournament bad," he said. "I really do." He had said the tournament was important because it might be what gets him into the Hall of Fame one day.

The round of the day was posted by Ken Duke, who shot a 65. Everybody was convinced he had actually played a different golf course than they did.

By late Sunday, we had a brand new champion, Jason Day, who is still hungry for victories.

"I look at Tiger and he's 79 or 80 (victories) or whatever it is, and Phil is up there, and I'm just like, okay, I want to be able to be looked back on and know that he was one of the greats in the game," Day said. "I have the opportunity to do that right now, try and work as hard as I can to really leave my footprint in this game that has given me so much."
